

The Death Penalty in Dallas County

- With **108 total death sentences** since 1974, Dallas ranks second behind Harris County in use of the death penalty in Texas.
- Although it remains among Texas's top sentencing counties, Dallas County juries have imposed just one death sentence since 2013.
- Of the **13** individuals currently on death row who were convicted in Dallas, seven are Black, one is Hispanic, and five are white.
- Dallas voters strongly support alternatives to the death penalty, according to a poll conducted in June 2021 by the independent research firm Public Policy Polling. When asked which punishment they prefer for people convicted of first-degree murder, 75% of respondents opted for a sentence of life in prison with a possibility of parole after 20 or 40 years or life in prison without parole. Only 14% of all respondents prefer the death penalty.
- The State of Texas has executed **591 people** since 1982. This includes **65 people** who were convicted in Dallas County, three of whom were put to death in 2023.
- Since 1973, 200 individuals including 18 people in Texas have been released from death rows
 nationwide due to evidence of their wrongful conviction. Randall Dale Adams spent more than a
 decade in prison after he was wrongly convicted of killing a Dallas police officer.
- More than 65 individuals in Dallas County have been exonerated of serious crimes since 2001, largely on the basis of DNA evidence and/or mistaken eyewitness identification.
- **30 people** sentenced to death in Dallas County are no longer on death row; in most cases, their sentences were changed to life in prison or life in prison without parole or they died in custody of natural causes.
- Currently, there are 174 people on death row in Texas, including 7 women. Of this total population, **13 people were convicted in Dallas County**.

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
