

Facts about the Death Penalty

- New death sentences in Texas have **decreased significantly** since peaking in 1999, when juries sentenced 48 people to death. **For the past ten years, death sentences have numbered in the single digits.**
- To date in 2025, **two people have been sentenced to death**, both in Harris County. In a third capital case, a jury in Tarrant County rejected the death penalty.
- Texas juries sentenced **six people** to death in 2024; **Tarrant County** juries accounted for half of the new death sentences last year.
- Over the last five years, **nearly 70% of death sentences** in Texas have been imposed on people of color.
- **Jurors in just 13 counties in Texas** have imposed death sentences in the last five years. **Only two counties** (Harris and Tarrant) account for more than one death sentence in that time.
- The State of Texas has executed **595 people** since 1982, accounting for **more than one-third** of all executions nationwide since 1977.
- Texas executed **five men** in 2024. Three other individuals received stays of execution, including Robert Roberson.
- Texas has executed **four people** to date in 2025. One individual, David Wood, received a stay of execution.
- Currently, there are **170 people on death row** in Texas, including 7 women; this is the state's smallest death row population since 1985.
- Since 1973, **200 individuals who spent time on death row have been exonerated**. This includes 18 people in Texas, according to the Death Penalty Information Center.
- In Texas, the cost of an average death penalty case is **nearly three times higher** than imprisoning someone for life without the possibility of parole. Harris County recently spent **\$1.8 million** in taxpayer dollars in the case of Xavier Davis.
- **23 states and the District of Columbia** have abandoned the death penalty through legislation or judicial decisions. Governors in four other states have imposed a moratorium on executions.

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
